## 500 LIVES ARE REPORTED LOST

### CHURCHILL MAKES ANNOUNCEMENT IN HOUSE OF COMMONS

HE ALSO ANNOUNCED THAT THE BRITISH SUBMARINE E-14 HAD PENETRATED THROUGH DARDANELLES INTO SEA OF MARMORA, SINKING TWO TURKISH GUNBOATS AND TURKISH TRANSPORT—DETAILS ARE MEASUR.

By Associated Press—London, England, May 13.—Twenty British submarines, including the Gollath's crew were reported to have been sunk.

### CHURCHILL'S ANNOUNCEMENT IN HOUSE OF COMMONS

By Associated Press—London, England, May 13.—The British battleships E-14 and E-15 were reported to have been torpedoed in the Dardanelles.

It is feared that five hundred lives have been lost.

Announcement of the loss of the Gollath was made in the House of Commons today by Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty.

While no definite information apparently has been received as to the number of lives lost, Lord Churchill said he feared it would reach five hundred.

Mr. Churchill also announced that the British submarine E-14 had penetrated through the Dardanelles and into the Sea of Marmora, sinking two Turkish gunboats and a Turkish transport.

Mr. Churchill, in announcing the loss of the Gollath, said the British fleet was surprised by a torpedo attack by destroyers, while protecting the French fleet just inside the straits.

# President Putting British-French Troops Made Decided Finishing Touches on Note to Germany

## NOTICE WILL NOT BE MADE PUBLIC IN WASHINGTON UNTIL AFTER

### IT HAS BEEN PUT INTO CODE WHICH PROBABLY WILL BE LATE TODAY.

(Associated Press—Washington, D. C., May 13.—President Wilson during the morning put the finishing touches on the note to be dispatched during the day to Germany, demanding guarantees that attacks on merchantmen carrying supplies to the front would be stopped, and a cessation of American rights in the war zone.

The note will not be made public here until after it has been put into code, which probably will be late today, and when the document has been started on its way to Berlin.

### TWELVE OR FIFTEEN HUNDRED WORDS LONG

By Associated Press—Washington, D. C., May 13.—President Wilson's note to Germany on the sinking of the Lusitania will be given out in Washington this evening, Secretary Bryan announced today that the note contained 1,200 and 1,150 words long.

### FEW CHANGES MADE IN DOCUMENT

By Associated Press—Washington, D. C., May 13.—Few changes are believed to have been made in the document.

While concisely and friendly terms, it is firm. It does not say what step will be taken of what course will be pursued should Germany refuse to comply.

In some quarters friendly to Germany the inference is drawn that the Berlin government would accede to the American demands, and states the expectations of a United States would endeavor to secure the unrestricted passage of foodstuffs to the front.

### UNDER NEW LAW

The Young Man Convicted of Felony Was Given Parole.

Charlottesville, Va. May 13.—Steve England is probably the first person in West Virginia to get the advantage of the new statute, which permits the courts to parole any young man less than 21 years of age found guilty of a felonious charge.

England pleaded guilty to the charge of burglarizing the home of A. Frank and his attorney Charles P. Guard, asked the court to let him the benefit of the provisions of the new law. The court and prosecuting attorney looked into the matter and found that the law had become effective on April 22, the same date as that on which the present law was enacted.

England was given a parole for one year, which will be sufficient to send him to the penitentiary for a prison term.

## PIRATES DESTROY GERMAN PROPERTY IN JOHANNESBURG

### MORE THAN FIFTY BUILDINGS WHOLLY OR PARTIALLY WRECKED BY MOBS.

#### TOTAL LOSSES FROM RIOTING ARE PLACED WELL OVER A MILLION DOLLARS.

By Associated Press—Johannesburg, Union South Africa, May 13.—Violent anti-German demonstrations in Johannesburg culminated yesterday in the wrecking of a number of German and Austrian establishments. The police were virtually powerless.

More than 50 buildings have been wholly or partially wrecked or reduced to matchwood.

A mob destroyed the German Club and pillaged the office of the General Mining Corporation, burning all the books, records and papers of the company.

The total losses from rioting, which continued far into the night, are placed well over \$1,000,000.

### CAPTURED BY THE GERMANS IN AFRICA

By Associated Press—London, England, May 13.—An official statement from Capetown says that Windhoek, capital of German South West Africa, was captured yesterday without resistance by Union of South Africa forces, under General Buller.

Martial law was proclaimed throughout the conquered territory.

### ADDITIONAL TAXES ARE NOT NEEDED

#### DECLARE LEADING REPUBLICAN STATE SENATORS AT

#### GOVERNOR HATFIELD'S PURPOSE IS TO BUILD UP POLITICAL MACHINE.

Bluefield, W. Va., May 13.—The first of the series of meetings that the legislature senators are holding, took place here last night, and was most successful. A large and representative group of leading Republicans and Senators Rosenbloom, Marshall, Hays, and Strother made speeches.

## Offensive Movements in the West

### LONDON COVERED BY NEWS FROM THE GALLIOLI PENINSULA.

#### SOME REPORTS INDICATE THAT THE ALLIES ARE IN COMPLETE CONTROL

#### AT TWO POINTS ON THE WESTERN LINE OF MILITARY OPERATIONS.

#### OFFENSIVE MOVEMENTS ARE UNDERWAY—GERMAN AND FRENCH ACTIVE.

By Associated Press—London, England, May 13.—London was covered today by the publishing of a despatch from Athens recording a decided advance of British and French troops along the Gallipoli peninsula.

Some reports even claimed the occupation of certain details, which would mean that the entire peninsula was under the control of the invaders.

At two points on the western line of operations, offensive movements are under way.

The first, initiated by the Germans, is against the British, French and Belgian troops, near Ypres, while the second is against the French troops against the Germans to the north of Arras.

For the moment, however, both of these attacks would appear to have been checked.

In the Balkan frontier, Petrograd reports a brilliant success won by the Russian coasts over Austria Infantry.

The Russian horsemen forcing their way through a series of barbed wire entanglements, killed the Austrians from three lines of trenches, and captured 2,000 prisoners, a battery of heavy field guns and other munitions of war.

The possibilities of a final Austro-German victory in Galicia as the result of the advance from Cracow, is said by the war office at Petrograd to have been eliminated.

### FRENCH WAR OFFICE REPORTS BIG SUCCESS

By Associated Press—London, England, May 13.—The French war office announces that success has been won in the new offensive in the north of France.

The French captured the fort of Lorette, the fort of the village of Lorette, and most of the villages of Neuville and hundreds of Germans were bayoneted and 1,500 taken prisoners.

### SPARK AWAITED TO START FURTHER WAR

By Associated Press—Vienna, Austria, May 13.—Every day the Austrian government is in the proclamation of a state of siege in all the Austrian territory which borders on the Italian frontier.

The government already is in the hands of the police and military authorities, and it is expected to arrive at the frontier at some point Italian and Austrian troops are on the alert.

## PEACE ADVOCATES AT CLEVELAND

### MOVEMENT LAUNCHED WHICH ITS ADVOCATES SAY IS THE GREATEST

#### ADVANCE YET TAKEN TOWARD LASTING PEACE AMONG WORLD POWERS.

By Associated Press—Cleveland, Ohio, May 13.—With the opening here of the World Court Congress, a movement formally was launched, which its advocates say is the greatest advance yet taken toward lasting peace among the world powers.

Prominent men from all over the country, including William H. Taft, Alton B. Parker and many others, were present, giving assurance, Mayor Newton D. Baker said in his welcoming address, that the movement is not visionary, nor impracticable.

The Congress plans an international Court of Justice, founded on an agreement to which all the great powers would be signatory.

### BRITISH GOVERNMENT TAKES DRABTIC MEASURES AS RESULT OF RIOTS
